Work in Progress: Ashlawn Cutting – Jolly's Field

What's the problem here?

Ashlawn cutting is an enjoyable linear walk, however the historical use and layout of the cutting means the line isn't as "straightforward" as it looks. Jolly's field was once a small meadow that drained into the reservoir pool to provide water for the steam engines that once ran along the cutting. Over the years this field has been lost with the scrub slowly encroaching, making it secluded and difficult to access. Also, the scrub shades out the grassland and makes the site less valuable to wildlife as wildflowers do not flourish and insects such as butterflies lose out.

What is being done?

The project here, part funded from a Warwickshire County Council - Rugby Areas Councillor fund, will cut down and remove some of the scrub to open a new woodchip pathway. Thus providing a circular access walk for people and further create open areas for grasses and wildflowers to recolonize. The scrub cut down will be chipped and used to create a new path surface and also at the same time some new pools and scrapes will be created along the main track to alleviate the flooding.

When will the work be taking place?

The plan is to spend a number of days cutting the scrub – starting in early February **2013** (subject to the weather).
